Henry Kammann, (0) of the town of Bunker Hill, in the County of Macoupin, and State of Illinois, formerly a Soldier of the United States of America, in the war against (1) United States, respectfully asks that he be admitted as a member of said Home.

To enable the authorities to determine whether or not he is legally entitled to become a member of said Home, he declares and states the facts to be that he is now 67 years old; that he is 6 feet and 2 inches high; that he is of Sallow complexion, Blue eyes, and Gray hair; that he was born in the town of Braman in the Germany of March, 1837; that he has been (2) twice enrolled in the U. S. A. service; in the war against U. S. States, and was in the war of the late Rebellion; and that he has been (3) twice honorably discharged from the service of the United States. That the following is a true statement of the time and place of his enrollment and discharge from said service, and that the cause of his discharge, and of his rank at the respective date thereof namely:

That he has (4) no wife; that he has no children now living; ages, respectively, (5) ----- years. That his postoffice address is Bunker Hill, State of Illinois; that his nearest railway station is Bunker Hill, on the Big Four Railway, in Macoupin County, in said State; that the name and address of the person to whom he desires notice of his illness or death shall be given, is W. J. H. Faber Kray, of Bunker Hill, County of Macoupin, State of Illinois; that, in case of his death, he desires all his personal effects to be sent to W. J. H. Faber Kray, at Bunker Hill County of Macoupin State of Illinois

That he has not heretofore been a member of any Soldiers', Sailors', or other Charitable Home or Institution, excepting the (6) -----

That he is now a bona fide resident of the State of Illinois, and has continuously lived and resided in said State for the last two years, or has served in an Illinois organization.

That he is so far disabled by (7) Old age, Rheumatism and General debility

as to now be incapable of earning his own living.

That he has at all times, heretofore, supported and adhered to the government of the United States of America, and that he has not at any time been engaged in, or countenanced, or aided, or abetted, the cause of the late Rebellion. That if he shall be admitted to be a member of the said Home, he will, in all things and in every respect, comply with and conform to the rules and regulations made, or that shall hereafter be made, for the government and discipline of the same; and that he will cheerfully do and perform any and all things that shall be required of him by those there in authority over him; and that he will promptly, and willingly, obey all lawful orders that he shall receive from any officer of the Home, so long as he shall remain a member thereof.

Washington, D.C., October 9th., 1918.

Dear Mr. Hamann:

I deem it proper to call your attention to the remarkably liberal legislation enacted under the present Administration for the benefit of the old soldier and his widow and dependents.

My opinion has always been that this country owes a debt to its veterans that can never be fully repaid. I have always been in favor of legislation intended to benefit the soldier and his family, and it will continue to receive my earnest support.

Following is a brief resume of the legislation enacted by the present Congress and promptly approved by the President:

(1) The Act of March 4, 1913, providing for automatic increase of pension under the Act of May 11, 1912, on account of age and service, without further application on the part of the pensioner. This Act was of very great service to soldiers, as it allowed increase without any effort on their part.

(2) The Act of September 8, 1916 (Section 1), providing increase of pension for a widow who was the lawful wife of an officer or enlisted man during the period of his service in the Civil War, to \$20 per month; and increasing to the same rate the pension of widows of veterans of the Civil War, the Mexican War, and the War of 1812, upon their attaining the age of 70 years.

Section 2 of the same Act, providing restoration to the pension roll, under certain conditions, of widows dropped therefrom by reason of remarriage; also establishing title to original pension of certain other "remarried widows."

Section 3 of the same Act, extending provisions of the Act of April 19, 1908, to the widows of Civil War veterans who married the soldier or sailor prior to June 27, 1905.

Records indicate that approximately 200,000 widows have benefited by the provisions of the Act of September 8, 1916.

(3) The Act of March 4, 1917, providing pension of \$20 per month, under certain conditions, to the survivors of certain Indian Wars, and \$12 per month to their widows.


(4) The Act of October 6, 1917, (Section 314), increasing to \$25 per month the rate of pension of widows of officers or enlisted men who served in the Civil War, the War with Spain, or the Philippine Insurrection, which placed on the roll at \$25 per month approximately 284,000 widows.

(5) The Act of June 10, 1918, providing a rate of pension ranging from a minimum of \$30 to a maximum of \$40 per month, depending on age or length of service, to all Civil war veterans who have title to pension under the Act of May 11, 1912.

(5) The Act of July 16, 1918, providing pension at the rate of \$12 per month to widows (with \$2 per month additional for each child under 16 years of age) of certain veterans of the War with Spain, the Philippine Insurrection, or the Chinese Boxer rebellion campaign, who married the soldier or sailor prior to the passage of the Act and whose net annual income, exclusive of their own annual labor, does not exceed \$250 per year; and, in case of death or remarriage of the widow, extending the same benefit to children under 16 years of age.

My secretaries or I remain here practically all the year round, in close touch with the Pension Office, and will be only too glad to take up any pension matter concerning yourself or friends about which you may see fit to advise me.
